Project Managers are currently working on two projects:

- Mental health
- · Lack of funding for social care

The highlight reports below give an update on progress on these projects. The key points to notes are:

Mental health

- The project is progressing well.
- All the sub-contracted work (around mental health in veterans, people who are homeless and people on Universal Credit) is now complete and the organisations have submitted their reports.
- Internal work is also going well: the online survey for the LGBT community received 32 responses, the data analysis has been completed and the report is underway.
 Consultations with the African and Caribbean community have been completed, a draft report written and final amendments are taking place. The student on placement has completed the survey with fellow students at Northumbria University and is in the process of writing her report. The internal report will be complete by the end of the month.

Lack of funding for social care

- The project is progressing well but has been quite labour intensive due to various consultations that have arisen; the research is now complete.
- Developed consultation and engagement for Local Government Authority green paper on adult social care and wellbeing and submitted response to Health and Wellbeing Board.
- Developed consultation for Gateshead Council's budget proposals and held budget proposal event, where 50 people had their say. This was submitted along with the response from Chair.
- Surveyed previous service users affected by last budget changes; this was a small amount (around 12) but showed that service users and carers felt their quality of life had deteriorated since 2016. This was sent to Steph Downey for information. Submitted findings to Local Authority.
- I am in the process of writing the final report.

Update on CHC

Followed up work on continuing healthcare (CHC) with Newcastle Gateshead CCG. Requested that the CCG update its website with the NHS England information on CHC which reflects the changes made to the framework nationally: www.england.nhs.uk/healthcare Deadline by Friday 8 February.

We plan to ask all participants in the research a series of short questions. We will gather answers to these questions through a combination of focus groups, structured one to one interviews and surveys. We will undertake most of the research ourselves but will also offer local organisations or community groups the opportunity to carry out work on our behalf. We will offer three small grants of up to £1,000 to enable specialist organisations to gather the views of those groups Healthwatch would struggle to engage with effectively within a limited time scale.

Risks

- We may struggle to recruit partner organisations and/or the recruitment process may take longer than expected
- People from the specified groups may not engage with the project
- Partner organisations may not stick to the research brief and/or the timescales
- The quality of the partner organisations work may not meet expectation/requirements

HWG could give people the opproposed cuts and feedback are carers and their families. This	Lack of funding for social care was chosen by Healthwatch Gateshead as a priority for 2018-19. There were proposed cuts to social care identified in 2016-18 but equality impact assessments had not taken place prior to the proposals so it was decided by Gateshead Council that individuals and their carers would need to be assessed individually before taking the proposals further The proposed budget cuts on social care are due to go to cabinet on Friday 23 November and the consultation is likely to last around 6-8 weeks. This is the opportunity for service users and carers to have their say, however, the consultation will run through the Christmas period which will limit the time for actual consultation. HWG could give people the opportunity to have their say on future cuts around the proposed cuts and feedback any impact the previous cuts have had on service users carers and their families. This will form part of the consultation. We also gave people the opportunity to have their say on the LGA green paper
